

WEEKS 1-4

WEEK 1	Choose a <u>fiction</u> book to read. Plan out how many pages or chapters you need to read each day or week to have the book finished at the end of the four weeks.	Read the title and the back. Make 3-5 predictions based on the title and what you read on the back.	What type of fiction is the book you chose? Provide evidence to support your answer.	Choose a character from your book. Infer how the character feels in a section of the book. Include the evidence to support your inference.	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 2	Determine a possible theme for your book. Explain why you chose that theme.	Choose two characters from the book and compare and contrast them.	What point of view is the story told from? How do you know?	Take an event from what you have read so far and turn it into a short play.	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 3	Who is the most important character in your book? Prove that they are the most important.	Write five words that you didn't know or that you found interesting in what you have read so far. Use context clues to determine the meaning of the words.	Choose a character from the book. Describe the character in depth.	Choose a section from what you read this week to rewrite from another point of view.	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 4	What is the most important chapter or event in the book so far? Explain the reason for your choice.	Create a new title for your book. Explain why you chose that title and how it matches the book.	Write five words that you didn't know or that you found interesting in what you have read so far. Use context clues to determine the meaning of the words.	Create an illustration for your book. Explain why you chose that illustration and how it matches the book.	Write a review of the book. Include a basic summary (don't give away the main details) and what your opinion of the book is.

WEEK 5	Choose a <b>nonfiction</b> book to read. Plan out how many pages or chapters you need to read each day or week to have the book finished at the end of the four weeks.	Write down at least three facts that you already know about this topic.	Write 3-5 questions that you had about this topic before you began reading the book.	Determine which text features your book has. (Example: table of contents, glossary, index)	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 6	Write five words that you didn't know or that you found interesting in what you have read so far. Use context clues to determine the meaning of the words.	Find an illustration with a caption. Summarize what the illustration and caption are teaching you about the topic.	Find a section of the book that follows a specific text structure. Summarize the section, and tell which text structure it uses.	Choose a section or page. Write the main idea and supporting details for that section.	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 7	Choose a graphic or illustration used in your text. Write three questions that can be answered using the graphic or illustration. Answer the questions.	Pretend that you have to teach what you learned from reading this book to a friend. What will you tell them about the topic?	Write five words that you didn't know or that you found interesting in what you have read so far. Use context clues to determine the meaning of the words.	Find an illustration with a caption. Summarize what the illustration and caption are teaching you about the topic.	Summarize what you have read so far in 2-3 sentences.
WEEK 8	Does the author have a positive, negative, or neutral viewpoint of the topic? Explain how you know.	Is the author trying to persuade you in any way? Find an example in the book.	Create a new illustration for a section of your book. Write a caption to match the illustration. Explain how your illustration and caption match the text.	What questions do you still have about the topic? Where can you look to find the answers to the questions?	Write a review of the book. Include a basic summary (don't give away the main details) and what your opinion of the book is.
